












WHERE TEXANS HAVE SEEN, READ, OR HEARD DMWT

Q8. Where have you seen, read, or heard the slogan "Don't Mess with Texas"?








COMPARING LITTERING SITUATIONS – Q9A to Q9G







Q13. What types of materials do you think are pretty minor litter problem?













Q23. In your own words, what would convince you to participate?




TYPICAL DAILY MILEAGE

Q24. In a typical day, how many miles do you drive or ride in a motor vehicle?




TEXANS' VEHICLE TYPE






LIKELIHOOD TO STOP PUTTING TRASH IN BED

Q29. What kinds of trash tend to accumulate INSIDE your vehicle?




LITTER BAG OR TRASH CAN IN VEHICLE




NIGHTTIME ENTERTAINMENT

Q32. Approximately how many evenings per week do you go to parties, bars, or other nighttime entertainment places?




CIGARETTE BUTT DISPOSAL

Q35. When you are in a vehicle, do you usually dispose of cigarette butts ... (n=241)




OPEN END: STOP LITTERING CIGARETTE BUTTS

Q36. What would it take to make you stop littering your cigarette butts or cigarette packs?





CONCLUSIONS



55% of respondents admit to littering, 72% admit to littering themselves or with someone who littered.



18-24 year olds (77%) are significantly more likely to litter than senior citizens (36%).



There are distinct messages that correlate with one's reduced likelihood (89%) of littering. These messages differ from those messages that correlate with one's increased likelihood of properly disposing of litter (94%).
